Appendix C: Best Practices

Best Practice No. 1

Title: International Confluence on Educational and cultural exchange between student teacher of

SNDT College of Educational, Pune and Telemark University, Norway.

Context: International understanding is supposed to be an important value to be inculcated

among student teachers. In this age of globalization sufficient inputs should be given through

teacher education regarding educational system and cultural significance of various countries.

The sharing of ideas on education and culture of both countries helps in enriching mutual

understanding and learning from each other.

Goals:

To enable our student teachers to-

• Interact with student teachers from Norway

Exchange ideas regarding education and culture of India and Norway

• Present cultural program reflecting enriched diversified culture of India

• Observe and appreciate cultural programs of student teaches from Norway

Practice: This international confluence was organized on 23rd Jan.2015. our college got an

opportunity to establish contact with the team of 20 student teachers and one teacher educator

from Telemark University, Norway, which had been already on visiting tour in Maharashtra.

After formal introduction and welcome done by our principal, two of our faculty members Dr.

Sohani and Dr. tapkeer presented information about Indian education system and the activities of

the college. This was followed by cultural programs of our student teacher. On this occasion a

special exhibition was also arranged on Indian Education and culture. Every subject education

group of our college had selected different topics of exhibition such as Indian philosophy, Indian

geography, science in ancient India, progress in mathematics, Indian saints and thinkers,

linguistic diversity in India.

Our student teacher had a very good opportunity of interacting with the student teachers of

Norway. The guest student teaches observed the exhibition carefully and ask many questions to

satisfy their doubts. Our students teaches also gave them the first hand experience of 'Rangoli'

and 'Mehendi'

Evidence of success

- In the oral and written annual leed back at the end of the year. Student teachers express their joy and gratitude about these experience of confluence.

Problems encountered and resources needed:

- The confluence had to be organized in short notice of time, hence time constraint for overall preparation and exhibition was to be faced.
- Our college being Marathi medium college, language being barrier was to be faced while communicating with foreign student teachers.
- Resources used :

Stationery for exhibition and drapery for cultural program were collected by student teachers. The hospitality of Norwegian student teachers (lunch, breakfast, tea etc.) was catered through college funds.

Best Practice No. 2

Title: Educational Visit for academic and community work input.

Context: Our institution arranges educational visits to such places where our student teachers

get opportunity to observe, interact and to work with a specified class of students like socially

deprived, physically handicapped, mentally retarded, gifted etc. We spend a whole day with

those students. We arrange educational games for them and engage them throughout the day.

Through our extension activities we are committed to develop and empower women teachers

with universal values and sense of social commitment and well prepared to meet the challenges

of socio cultural values. One such visit was organized in year 2014-15 to Sadhana Village which

is home for mentally challenged adults.

Goals:

1. To make student teachers aware regarding their social responsibilities.

2. To give student teachers an opportunity to identify the basic needs of diverse

learners.

3. To provide student teachers an opportunity to interact with diverse learners

Practice:

Before the visit, we all faculty members discussed about the place of visit. We searched

an institute Sadhana Village which is fully socially committed and particularly working for

mentally challenged adults. We contacted authority of that Institute and discussed with them

aims of our visit. Then we gave brief idea of such type of learners to our student teachers and

asked them to prepare learning material and activities for such types of learners. This material

included educational games, moral stories, poems, rhymes, singing of songs, and kinesthetic

activities such as drawing, painting, preparation of paper bags etc.

After introduction by the director of Sadhana Village, Mentally challenged adults who were

named as special friends gave their performances. After that program student teachers and

diverse learners were distributed in the groups and student teachers engaged diverse learners

through various activities according to their planning. The special friends enjoyed the activities

and prepared greetings, paper bags, drawings and artificial flowers. Our student teachers got

experience of interacting, giving suggestions and conducting creative activities for special

friends. In the afternoon session after lunch once again student teachers, faculty members of our college and teachers from that institute gathered together and discussed about conducted activities. Student teachers asked their doubts to concerned teachers of the school.

Obstacles:

- Due to household difficulties and responsibilities some student teachers could not join the educational visits.
- Due to time constraint and economical constraint we could not plan educational visits for longer duration.

Evidence of Success:

Student teachers wrote detailed report of the visit in which they expressed how they became aware about problems of mentally challenged and social responsibility as would be teachers. Some student teachers expressed wish to work for such institutes for person with special needs.

Requisite resources:

- Careful planning of educational visit involving entire faculty and student council.
- Student teachers and faculty contributed travelling expenses.
